

# Power Amplifier Accessory Speaker

(Order Code PAAS-PAMP)

This kit includes a speaker and accessories used with the Vernier Power Amplifier to study mechanical waves and springs. The speaker contains a light weight metal disc glued to the speaker cone. A drive post attached to the metal plate allows you to connect objects such as strings and springs. The Vernier Power Amplifier is normally connected to the Vernier Power Amplifier which is connected to the Vernier LabQuest or Vernier LabPro. Experiments include

- Observing standing waves on a string including harmonics.
- Measuring the speed of a wave on a string.
- Observing resonance in simple harmonic motion.

The Power Amplifier Accessory Speaker kit includes

- (1) 5 ¼ inch shielded speaker with an adaptable driver post
- (1) elastic string
- (2) springs with different spring constants
- (2) masses
- (2) threaded hooks
- (1) spacer



## Software and Hardware Combinations

The speaker is driven by the Power Amplifier, which is software controlled by your computer or handheld. This kit and the Power Amplifier can be used with the Vernier LabQuest or Vernier LabPro. Some combinations of equipment allow you to drive the speaker and simultaneously collect data.

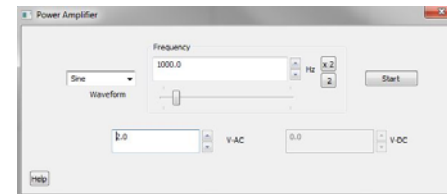
## Using the Power Amplifier Speaker with the Power Amplifier

The Power Amplifier Speaker has rubber feet on the bottom of the case for secure placement on a table. The case has a 3/4 inch hole that is used to mount the speaker on a ring stand. Leads from the speaker are used to connect it to the output of the Power Amplifier. When this speaker is used with the Power Amplifier, the maximum recommended signal is  $\pm 5$  volt peak amplitude. Signals above 5 volts will exceed the 1 ampere current limit of the amplifier, and the signal will be distorted.

## Software Setup

**Using LabQuest with Logger Pro** – If you are using a computer and LabQuest, software control is provided in Logger Pro.

1. Connect the Power Amplifier to a LabQuest and power up the Power Amplifier. (See the Power Amplifier user's manual for connection instructions.)
2. Wire the Power Amplifier to the Power Amplifier Accessory Speaker.
3. In Logger Pro, choose Set Up Sensors in the Experiment menu and choose the LabQuest.
4. A dialog box will appear. Click the Power Amplifier button.
5. The Power Amplifier dialog box will appear. Use this dialog box to control the waveform, frequency and amplitude of the signal.
6. While the speaker is being driven, you can also collect data with Logger Pro.

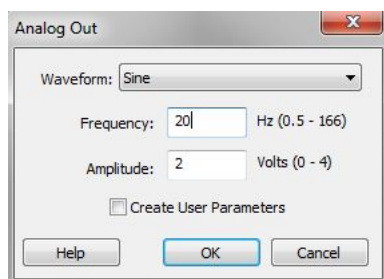


**Using LabPro with Logger Pro** – If you are using a computer and LabPro, software control is provided in Logger Pro.

1. Connect the Power Amplifier to a LabPro and power up the Power Amplifier. (See the Power Amplifier user's manual for connection instructions.)
2. Wire the Power Amplifier to the Power Amplifier Accessory Speaker.
3. In Logger Pro choose Set Up Sensors from the Experiment menu and choose the LabPro. A dialog box will appear. To the left of the LabPro graphic, you will see a list of the four analog channels. The Power Amplifier will appear in channel CH4. Note that the default setting for the Power Amplifier is to measure current in amperes; however, LabPro cannot simultaneously measure current through channel CH4 and drive a signal through this channel. Therefore the next three steps will instruct you how to reconfigure this channel.
4. Click the icon that represents channel CH4. A pop up dialog box will appear.



- Select Choose Sensor. A list of sensors will appear. Scroll through the list and choose Voltage and then choose Raw Voltage (+/- 10 V).
- Once again click the CH4 icon but now select Analog Out.
- The Analog Out dialog box will appear. Use this dialog box to control the waveform, frequency, and amplitude of the signal. Click the OK button to start sending the signal from LabPro to the Power Amplifier. Note: a gain of a factor of two is applied to the LabPro input, so that a LabPro output of 1 V results in a Power Amplifier output of 2 V.
- Return to the Analog Out dialog box to modify the signal setting.
- While the speaker is being driven, you can also collect data with *Logger Pro*.



**LabQuest App** – If you are using LabQuest with the Power Amplifier and speaker, control is provided by an app on the LabQuest.

- Connect the Power Amplifier to a LabQuest. (See the Power Amplifier user's manual for connection instructions.)
- On LabQuest tap the Home button in the application tray at the bottom of the screen.
- Choose Power Amplifier.
- Use this app to control the waveform, frequency and amplitude of the signal.
- If you want to also collect data while the speaker is being driven, you can switch to the LabQuest App to set up and collect data.



### Using SensorDAQ and LabVIEW

- Connect the Power Amplifier to the SensorDAQ using the screw terminal connections and the BTA connector on the Power Amplifier. (See the Power Amplifier user's manual for connection instructions.)
- Wire the Power Amplifier to the Power Amplifier Accessory Speaker.
- Open a sample VI that controls the SensorDAQ analog output. Remember that the voltage is doubled by the Power Amplifier, so you should keep the peak voltage out of SensorDAQ at 2.5 volts or lower. SensorDAQ can update the analog output voltage 150 times/second so you should be able to use frequencies up to 20 or 30 Hz.

**FunctGen (TI-83 Plus or TI-84 Plus)** – A LabPro can be connected to a TI-83 Plus or TI-84 Plus graphing calculator. You are able to drive the speaker with a program called FunctGen on the calculator. You will not be able to simultaneously use sensors with the LabPro.

- Connect the Power Amplifier to a LabPro. (See the Power Amplifier user's manual for connection instructions.)
- Connect the graphing calculator to the LabPro.
- Start the FunctGen program on the calculator. (The FunctGen program is also a part of the VSTApp application. Both the program and application can be downloaded from the vernier.com.)
- Use the program to control the waveform, amplitude and frequency. **Note:** a gain of a factor of two is applied to the LabPro input, so that a LabPro output of 1 V results in a Power Amplifier output of 2 V.

## Performing Experiments with this kit

### Observing standing waves and harmonics

1. Place the speaker on the table and connect the Power Amplifier.
2. Attach the threaded hook screw to the driver plate. (Note: a small spacer is included with the equipment. It can be placed between the hook screw and the driver plate to elevate the hook screw.) Attach the elastic string to the hook screw.
3. Attach the other end of the elastic to a ring stand.
4. Move the speaker box to create tension in the string.
5. Use the software to generate a sine wave with a 4 V amplitude and a frequency of around 15 Hz.
6. Adjust the tension in the string until you have a standing wave for the fundamental frequency.
7. Double the frequency. Describe the change in the standing wave.
8. Triple the fundamental frequency. Describe the change in the standing wave.
9. Try quadrupling the frequency.



4. Attach a weight to the other end of the spring.
5. Knowing the spring constant of the spring and the mass of the weight, calculate the period and frequency with which the mass will oscillate.
6. Use the software to generate a sine wave with an amplitude of 4 V and a frequency of about 1 Hz. Observe the motion of the mass.
7. Increase the frequency slightly, e.g., 0.2 Hz. Observe the motion of the mass.
8. Continue to increase the frequency and approach the frequency calculated in Step 4 above.
9. Describe the motion of the weight when that frequency is reached.
10. Repeat the above with another spring and weight combination.



### Specifications

Speaker	5 ¼ inch shielded woofer, 30 W max, 8 Ω impedance, 5.8 Ω DC resistance
Spring (relatively soft)	Spring constant is approximately 5 N/m
Spring (stiffer)	Spring constant is approximately 15 N/m

### Measuring the speed of a wave on an elastic string

1. Place the speaker on the table and connect the Power Amplifier.
2. Attach a Dual-Range Force Sensor to a ring stand.
3. Attach the threaded hook screw to the driver plate.
4. Attach the elastic string to the hook screw post on the speaker.
5. Attach the other end of the string to the force sensor.
6. Move the speaker box to create tension in the string.
7. Use the software to generate a sine wave with an amplitude of 4 V and a frequency about 15 Hz.
8. Adjust the tension in the string until you have a standing wave of the fundamental frequency.
9. Use the data collection software to determine the tension in the string.
10. Knowing that the speed of the wave is equal to frequency multiplied by the wavelength, determine the speed of the wave.

### Observe resonance on a spring

1. Attach the threaded hook screw to the driver plate.
2. Attach the speaker to a ring stand with the speaker facing down.
3. Attach one end of the spring to the hook screw on the speaker.
